## Wellbeing Week

## Earlier this term our children took part in a range of activities as part of Mental Health Week 2021.

Reception wiggled their toes and grounded themselves with deep breaths in our outdoor area. The children explained that this made them feel calm and happy. We walked calmly over different textures and enjoyed the feeling beneath our feet. The sunshine on our faces and the grass between our toes put gigantic happy smiles on our faces.

Year 2 children explored nature as part of their work on raising awareness for Mental Health Week. They went into our garden and planting area and explore with their sense of sight, touch and smell. They then completed observational drawings of plants of their choice.

Year 4 discussed the importance of friendship to support our mental health. To build on this, they completed two problem solving activities. First, they attempted to solve the human knot, where they had to untangle themselves by working together. Then, they looked at the Chicken Crossing puzzle which required them to use our problem-solving skills and work as a team - it was fantastic to see our children so engaged.

## Engineers in the making!

Years 2 and 5 recently took part in the Young Engineers competition, where they had to think of a problem in everyday life and design a product to solve it. The children's ideas were then put forward to engineers, with a chance of the best ones being created!

We were extremely lucky to have a 1-to-1 meeting with Mike, an engineer from Siemens. Our curiosity shone when we asked Mike a variety of questions.

Aimee found out that through working with other engineers and companies, Mike had the opportunity to travel around the world to places in Europe and the USA!



## How do you spend Sunday?

As part of their religious education this term, our Year 6 pupils focussed on Christianity.

The class found out how people around school spend their Sunday. They collected data and then used their computing and maths knowledge to turn this data into a graph to present their findings. Year 6 found out that children enjoy having time to relax and play, spend time with their families and play sports. In our lesson, we learned why Sunday is a special day for Christians and how Sundays are used for worship.
