World Book Day 2023

At the beginning of March, we were once again delighted to celebrate World Book Day.

We started our day with a whole school assembly where pupils were greeted with fictional characters including Spider-Man, Elsa and The Very Hungry Caterpillar!

Throughout the day, all pupils took part in a range of exciting activities including recreating artwork from the illustrations of the book, *We're All Wonders*, spending time reading to different children from different classes and even taking part in live lessons with real authors!

To add to the excitement, each class visited our new school libraries, where pupils can read their book in a comfortable environment and check-out any book they want to take home.





Faith at spring

As a predominantly Christian country, most of the UK celebrates **Easter** during the spring time to mark the resurrection of Jesus after his crucifixion. Each year, Easter Sunday takes place on a different date - the first Sunday after the full moon that occurs on or after the spring equinox.

Passover, a spring holiday in the Jewish calendar, also takes place in spring. Passover celebrates the Biblical story of the Israelites' escape from slavery in Egypt. It is tradition to eat a special bread that does not contain yeast (unleavened bread) called matzo. You must have speed on your side when making matzo as the bread begins to rise after 18 minutes!

Ramadan is celebrated by those who follow Islam and this year it's from the end of March to the end of April. Those who celebrate Ramadan practice fasting, prayer, reflection and celebrating community. Food can only be eaten after sunset or just before dawn, meaning many families create plentiful feasts to enjoy after daylight hours.



Online safety

This term we marked Safer Internet Day at Sacriston Academy and this year's theme 'Want to talk about it? Making space for conversations about life online'.

In assembly everyone spoke about how sometimes people can be unkind online and that sometimes information shared online is not always the truth. Linking to this year's theme, the group talked about what they should do if they ever feel worried about something that has happened online. Our digital leaders and art leaders have spent time creating posters to reinforce this around school.

This term Year 4 have continued to learn to play the cello and viola and have started listening to a range of different songs and appraising them. Bubble-tastic



Liz brought with her an Enigma machine that was actually used by the Germans in World War II to transmit coded messages. An Enigma machine allows for billions of ways to encode a message that made it incredibly difficult for other nations to crack during the war.

Liz demonstrated how it worked and the group were amazed at the intricate details inside the machine. The class also got to see a virtual tour of Bletchley Park while Liz explained its importance during WWII. Before Liz left, she held a special assembly for other pupils to share her knowledge.
