

VE day marks 75 years since the guns fell silent at the end of the war in Europe, and whilst many are likening isolation to the war effort, the differences are actually quite immense.

When the civilians in Britain were on lockdown during WW2, they often had to leave their homes and places of work without warning and rush to safety. They couldn't grab their belongings or their special items and had to hope that they would be able to return to them soon.

We have previously looked at instruction writing, ensuring we include a time adverb (first, next, then, finally), numbered instructions and imperative, bossy verbs!

Imagine you are one of our WW2 civilians. Can you write some instructions for someone to pack you a bag with 4 of your most special items? Include juicy vocabulary and give them more guidance by including adverbs of manner and place.

Friday

Can you use a dictionary or Britannica Kids dictionary through Google to ensure you know the meaning of all the words in this vocab mat?

PSHE - Put yourself in someone else's shoes

(For this activity you will need to talk to someone and get their thoughts on it too)

Imagine that self-isolation happened the year that many of you were born.

The statistics show us that twice as many people were living on their own than 50 years before that, and that 12 out of every 100 people had to look after somebody else in their family.

What do the other pieces of information show us?

Can you discuss how each piece of information shows that people would be experiencing lockdown in different ways, with different problems and different experiences?
